## **Project Description: Decent Housing through Code Enforcement**

According to the 2009-2011 American Community Survey 3-Year Estimates, 24.9% of occupied housing units in Port Hueneme were built between 1940 and 1959 and 50.1% were built between 1960 and 1979. This means that 75% of occupied housing units in Port Hueneme are between 33 and 72 years of age. This program provides low interest loans between \$5,000 and a maximum of \$50,000 for low-income families to rehabilitate and improve their homes. #### Project Description: Public Service - Seniors

The Ombudsman is the federally mandated advocate for elderly persons living in long term care facilities. He/she makes unscheduled, unannounced visits to the facilities and works with the elderly residents investigating complaints and resolving issues on their behalf. The 9,500 elderly persons living in 228 long term care facilities in Ventura County are their target population.

#### **Analysis**

For more than 30 years, Area Agency on Aging monitoring reports show that the Ombudsman program meets or exceeds its goals. In FY 2014-15, an estimated 7,664 low/mod income senior residents will be assisted by this program, county-wide. The services offered by this program meet a high priority goal of the Consolidated Plan and are not duplicated by any other services in the county. Recommend funding.

## **Project Description: Public Service – Homeless**

This program provides direct street outreach and case management for both chronic and episodic homeless individuals who desire to change the pathway of their lives. Case management will involve a full assessment and evaluation of the individual's needs and identification of housing options. Other services include linkages to entitlement benefits, mental and physical health resources, housing search and placement assistance, and financial planning education.

### **Analysis**

Lutheran Social Services (LSS) have formed a collaboration to address the need for rapid re-housing services in the east end of Ventura County. During the last program year, LSS housed 24 chronically homeless clients in Conejo Valley and Camarillo and Project Understanding housed 27 clients. Each of these clients has entered into an H2H Action Plan contract with a case manager to ensure success. Funds will be used for staff costs for case management, housing search and placement and housing stability case management for the H2H program. Funding is recommended for this HUD high priority, best-practice project and new guiding principle in the 10YS.

## **Project Description: Public Service - Youth**

The Children's Home Society of California (CHS) is proposing to expand its existing services to Ventura County by implementing the Homeless Family Support Program, while simultaneously conducting a community needs assessment of homeless children and families. The goal is to identify the developmental needs of homeless children to connect them with support services, while educating and empowering their parents and caregivers.

#### **Analysis**

While CHS is an established organization primarily in child care and adoption services, this is a new program that is not yet in operation and does not currently have staff in place to administer the program. The application indicates there is no direct case management or services provided beyond referrals to other service providers. The ratio of leveraged funds to the projected overall cost of the program shows that the CDBG funding requested would not be utilized as simply gap funding, as it should be. Educational needs assessment for youth are not a high priority in the consolidated plan and CHS historically has not received HUD funding and therefore has no demonstrated experience with Federal compliance requirements. No funding is recommended at this time.
