Budget Digest 2008-2009

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BUDGETARY OVERVIEW

The FY 2008-09 County budget was adopted by the Board of Supervisors on June 16, 2008.

Overall, total County budgeted appropriations increased by \$37 million over prior year's adopted budget, representing a 2.3% increase.

Total budgeted revenues increased 1.5% or \$22 million over prior year budget amounts. All tax revenue increased by \$9 million or 2.3% while all secured property tax revenue increased by \$11.4 million over the same period, an increase of 4.1%.

The number of full time equivalent (FTE) positions increased by 85 to a total of 8,050 representing an increase of 1.1% over prior year's adopted budget.

The budget includes estimated retirement costs of \$140 million, an increase of approximately \$3 million from prior year. Although the employer contribution rate decreased from 19% to 17%, total retirement costs increased slightly as the lower rate was applied to higher payroll costs.

Although the budget is balanced, there are a number of issues that may negatively impact future budgets including increases in medical insurance and retirement costs, an increasing jail population, seismic retrofitting of the hospital, future State audits, and various facilities maintenance projects.

As a result of the State's delay in adopting a budget, the County will need to review its budget to ensure that any State funding reductions to County programs are offset by corresponding reductions in the affected departments' budget or offset by alternative revenue sources.

Ventura County's revenue sources can be divided into discretionary and nondiscretionary categories, depending on whether the use of the revenue is restricted to a specific activity.

The majorities of County revenues are not discretionary and must be used only for specific State and Federal programs. The costs of such programs are generally not fully covered by the State or Federal governments. This requires the County to use discretionary General Fund revenues to cover unreimbursed costs.

Discretionary revenue sources, which can be used for any legal purpose, include general fund property taxes, general sales tax, and interest earnings. These types of revenue sources have declined in past years, primarily due to the State's decision to balance its budget by reducing the County's share of local property taxes.

- Total General Fund (GF) appropriations of \$900 million increased 2.7% over prior year adopted figures and 3.6% over prior year actual expenditures.
- Total GF revenues estimated at \$900 million, an increase of 2.7% over prior year adopted amounts and 5% over prior year actual receipts.
- Total "Taxes" revenue is budgeted at \$285 million, an increase of 2.1% over prior year adopted budget and 3.4% over prior year actual amounts.

- Total budgeted reserves and designations balance of \$104 million represents 11.5% of total GF revenues, a decrease of \$16 million over prior year adopted budget.
- Total General Fund Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) positions increased by 32 to 4,869, an increase of 0.7% from the prior year's adopted budget.
- Budget includes funding for negotiated salary increases, a 2.7% services and supplies inflation factor and a \$2 million contingency.

- Ventura County's gross county product per capita in 2007 is estimated at 68,500, higher than that of the Tri-Counties at \$60,000 and California's gross state product per capita of \$48,300.
- 2007 Ventura County average salary for all sectors is estimated at \$46,500, higher than the 2006 average of \$45,000 and higher than the Tri-Counties average salary of \$42,700.

- Median family income for the County in 2007 remained unchanged from 2006 at \$79,500, but still higher than California's median family income of \$65,000.
- Job growth rate for all industries in 2007 was 0.6%, a net increase of 2,000 jobs; a lower rate is estimated for 2008.
- Ventura County's economic growth rate in 2008 is expected to be considerably lower than the annual 4% rate of past years due mainly to weakness in the real estate sector.

- As of June 2008, existing single-family home sales in Ventura County decreased 16% from June 2007.
- The County's median sales price for an existing detached single-family home was \$480,430 in June 2008, down 30.6% from the prior year. The large decline in sales price is due to credit tightening, consumer uncertainty and the increase in the number of distressed sales.
- Ventura County first-time buyer housing affordability index is estimated at 48% in the second quarter of 2008, compared to 25% in 2007. The 48% is similar to California index, but lower than the nation at 67%.
