4.0 Clean/Green Spotlight

Rachel Morris gave a brief overview as to how VCCOOL is supporting sustainability. The VCCOOL focus is to engage the Ventura community to reduce greenhouse gases. The company strives to influence policy by collaborating with the community collaborators to support lifestyle change and a green economy. A recent project is the Ventura Master Bikeway Plan. Accomplishments also include a Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) movement of \$700,000,000 of additional funds to active transportation in the 2012 regional transportation budget. VCCOOL is actively working with community partners such as businesses, the local school district, medical groups, religious organizations, non-profits, city, county and elected officials to engage the people of Ventura and support a local green economy.

5.0 Clean/Green Workforce Pipeline Development: Updates

Committee members agreed that engaging more employers in sustainability practices will increase the demand for clean/green related skills, jobs, and services. However, a higher level of business engagement will require significant culture change, and the Committee discussed the need for coordination and collaboration for county-wide educational effort. To develop a foundation for a regional discussion, the group identified several important steps:

- Inventory of green-related certifications/apprenticeships in other parts of California: George Kopf provided a summary of his research regarding energy-related certifications in California.
- Exploration of public/private sector green certification possibilities; why and how to engage in sustainability practices; return-on-investment benefits: in progress (Dave Fleish and Paul Grossgold)
- Inventory of green-related apprentice programs offered by unions: in progress (Rodney Cobos)
- Inventory of what K-12 schools and academies are doing related to green-related careers/certificates/pre-apprenticeships: in progress (Tiffany Morse)
- Inventory of what community colleges are doing related to green-related certificates/apprenticeships/programs (TBD)
- Inventory of what universities are doing related to green-related certificates/apprenticeships/programs: Valeria Makarova summarized her research on specific programs being offered by California Lutheran University (CLU) and California State University Channel Islands (CSUCI), to educate managers and professionals on energy related issues. CLU offers a sustainability program which includes Business of Renewable Energy Technologies with an overview of hydroelectric, biomass, biofuel. geothermal, wind and solar energies. CSUCI also offers sustainability-focused courses that provide valuable information for students on the various components of sustainability. Examples of courses are biology, chemistry, environmental economics, environmental science, and physics.

The Committee discussed ideas, awareness, types of jobs, and potential questions to consider in clean/green workforce development. The Committee outlined the need to define job requirements, identify educational resources, and identify opportunities for regional collaboration. Discussion will continue in future meetings to determine priorities and next steps in building a workforce pipeline for the region.

6.0 Two-Year Plan: Draft

At the next meeting, the committee will work on a two-year plan to identify and develop a strategy to address the regional priorities for green-related workforce development. Input received will be used to align committee activities with sector priorities of the five-year Ventura County Regional Strategic Plan for Workforce Development.
