PUBLIC COMMENT

Public comment is the opportunity for members of the public to participate in meetings by addressing the Oak Park Municipal Advisory Council in connection with one or more agenda or non-agenda items. Public comments by a member of the public at a single meeting are limited to a cumulative total of five minutes at such meeting unless the time allotment is increased or decreased by the Chair depending on the number of speakers. The public comment period during the opening part of the meeting to address non-agenda items is limited to 30 minutes total for all speakers; this 30-minute limit does not apply to items on the agenda.

To maintain a public meeting environment conductive and welcoming to receiving public comments from all members of the public, the audience is discouraged from engaging in displays of support or opposition to staff reports or public comments, including clapping, yelling, booing, hissing or cheering, that may create a disruptive environment for members of the public wishing to participate. Any person who disrupts or impedes the orderly conduct of a meeting will be instructed to cease the disruptive conduct. Failure to do so may result in that person being removed from the meeting.

Members of the public who would like to augment their comments with visual or audio presentations must submit their materials to the supervisorgorell@ventura.org for review at least 48 hours before the meeting. The review will be conducted to determine

only whether the materials are on matters within the jurisdiction of the Municipal Advisory Council, would be disruptive of the meeting, or would foster illegality, such as identity theft. If it is determined that materials are about matters not within the Municipal Advisory Council's jurisdiction, or would be disruptive of the meeting, or would foster illegality, use of County-provided equipment will not be allowed.

To: Greg Strakaluse C/O The Oak Park Municipal Advisory Committee:

I appreciate the opportunity to submit written comments regarding the new Ventura County Public Works Director, Greg Strakaluse. My name is Steven Kozel and I am a resident of Oak Park in Ventura County. I write to extend a welcome to Mr. Strakaluse and to share some observations and expectations regarding Ventura County Public Works and our community of Oak Park. As you become familiar with our community you will find residents appreciate the opportunity to live in an area with abundant open space and many opportunities for outdoor recreation. We value our environment and have a strong desire to preserve what makes Oak Park special. You will also find a significant number of folks in the community pay attention and have a deep knowledge of the history of the community and a deep knowledge of the surrounding environment. We are ready to step up and work with the Ventura County to protect our community and its surrounding open space. We are proud of the fact the open space including Rancho Simi Recreation and Parks Department is also a destination for many in the Southern California region.

It is in this context I share the following experience with Ventura County Public Works and our beloved Medea Creek. Medea Creek drains the Oak Park community and ultimately its water enters the Malibu Creek and the Pacific Ocean at Surfrider Beach in Malibu. The Malibu Creek watershed is one of the southernmost ranges of the steelhead trout. Folks in this area are dedicated to restoring the range of the steelhead, and critical to that is the health of the Malibu Creek watershed. When Medea Creek is adversely affected so is Malibu Creek.

Actions by Ventura County Public Works adversely affected the northwest tributary of Medea just south of Kanan road along Oak Hills Drive last October. Apparently concerns were raised about potential flooding of residences along Hollytree Dr. north of Kanan Road due to a blocked storm drain and culvert that drains water from a natural drainage north of the residences. This area experienced flooding in the past, so action was warranted. It was the extent of that action that is at issue. Over many days, about 250 feet of Medea Creek streambed and riparian habitat was "clearcut" by contractors to mitigate potential flooding. Keep in mind no flooding had occurred during tropical storm Hilary in late August 2023 (rainfall during this event exceeded 4 inches). The necessary mitigation should have only required the removal of a few willows blocking the Kanan Road culvert and removal of some small brush and sediment from the Oak Hills culvert draining the area above the Hollytree residences. Community members including folks with practical and professional expertise walked the site after the work was completed. Significant damage to the habitat occurred and it was stunning. The area has not recovered. What were some of the system failures contributing to this outcome?

- County Public Works assumed it had a permit from CDFW to conduct the work.
 The existing CDFW permit did not apply to this stretch of Medea Creek. Local
 residents did not observe a biologist on site during the time the work was
 performed. It is incumbent on the leadership of Ventura County Public Works to
 ensure policies and procedures insure compliance with the law.
- 2. When community members contacted various Public Works departments during work, staff did not seem to be aware of the work and could not respond to concerns raised by those members. There was also a question of jurisdiction. Was this Ventura County or was this Rancho Simi Recreation and Parks Department ordering and subcontracting the work?
- 3. When community members asked to see the county CDFW permits, documents were not produced in a timely manner. Only recently did members of the community receive the CDFW permit documents. A quick read of these documents established the affected stretch of Medea Creek was not included in the permits.

In my opinion this event demonstrated communication failures, jurisdictional responsibility failures, and a lack of transparency. From a community perspective, we ask, how can you assure us system changes have been made so this will not occur again?

In my opening comments I mentioned we are members of a community with in-depth knowledge of our surrounding open space. Residents are ready and willing to contribute information that may not be known by Public Works leadership. When the community experiences a situation similar to work performed on Medea Creek in October 2023, we have questions. Questions typically require an after action report which requires additional resources from the county to address the issues raised by the community members. This is not an efficient use of resources.

We are all stakeholders; we will step up. Community members in Oak Park can provide input. We are ready to work with Public Works to address issues constructively and achieve productive outcomes. We all benefit by doing so. Please give my comments some consideration and thought. Thank you for your time.

- October 6-12 is Fire Prevention Week. This year's national theme is Smoke
 Alarms: Make Them Work for You. Fire Prevention staff will be engaging
 residents about the importance of smoke alarms at several locations throughout
 the county, including Lowe's Home Improvement at 1027 Academy Drive in
 Thousand Oaks on Oct. 5 and The Oaks Mall Farmer's Market in Thousand
 Oaks on Oct. 10. Additionally, the department is hosting a social media Smoke
 Alarm Challenge in which residents are challenged to share a short video of their
 creative ways to test their smoke alarms.
- VCFD put a replacement ladder truck into service at Station 41 in Simi Valley on September 13. The new ladder truck is equipped with a pump that can provide water for fire suppression efforts, which is an upgrade over the previous ladder truck. The previous truck now joins the reserve apparatus fleet to maintain operations should one of the first run trucks break down.
- Recruiting for seasonal fire control workers will begin November 4. These
 employees are an important part of VCFD's fire suppression capabilities. Their
 primary role is the physical labor associated with fighting wildfires, such as
 digging lines to stop the spread of fire through light grasses and vegetation.

Forecasts by the National Geographic Area Coordination Center indicate a
developing La Niña pattern and a slight to moderate tilt in the odds towards
above normal large fire potential in our area for October and November. All
residents should remain vigilant with best practices to avoid potential fire starts.

12. Ventura County Sheriff's Office Report

- During the month of September, deputies working the Oak Park Community responded to 95 calls for service in September. They took 17 crime reports and 9 incident reports in July. They took 11 crime reports and 16 incident reports. Incident reports are generated from calls for service where deputies were unable to establish a crime but documented the incident. Those incidents are reviewed by Detectives to see if any further follow-up is required.
- Vandalism: There were two vandalism reports taken. Victim believes a suspect'(s) sprayed lawn killer on his grass causing an usual dead spot. Investigation was conducted by East County General Investigative Unit and no suspects were located.
- The second vandalism report was graffiti to the Triunfo Water and Sanitation water storage tank. The graffiti was illegible. The case was investigated by East County Major Crimes and closed with no suspects located.
- Forgery / Fraud cases: The victim fell prey to a Facebook scam and suffered a substantial financial loss. This case was investigated by the East County Financial Crimes Unit. Due to the suspects requesting and receiving crypto currency this case was forwarded to the FBI for further investigation. Social media and telephonic scams are frequently occurring.
- As a reminder banks and other legitimate businesses will not ask you to provide your personal information such as social security number or bank information.
 Also, if you are asked to pay the subject on the phone by gift card or crypto currency this is a scam. Call the Sheriff's Office immediately.
- Auto Crimes: There was a burglary from a motor vehicle. The actual burglary occurred in the month of March but was not reported until this month. The case was investigated by the General Assignment Unit and closed with no suspect information.
- Burglary: There were two burglary reports this month. First a known suspect entered the victim's home and stole their dog. The second was a residential burglary that occurred during the evening hours. This M.O. is consistent with our Trans-National Theft Groups. These cases are still under investigation by the Commercial Residential Burglary Unit.

- Thefts: Victim's license plate was stolen from their vehicle. The location of the theft is unknown. There are no suspects in this case. The case was investigated by the General Assignment Unit and closed.
- To help prevent theft from vehicles, we encourage everyone to lock their vehicles and remove all their valuable items. Remove it, Lock it, Keep it.

- 13. California Highway Patrol Report
- The CHP Moorpark Area continues to send Special Enforcement Units (SEU) to conduct targeted patrol throughout Oak Park. Citations are being issued for unsafe turns, unsafe passing, posted signage violations, unsafe speed, and various parking violations. Targeted patrols help saturate an area where multiple violations are known to be happening at once so multiple violations can be addressed in the area simultaneously.
- CHP Moorpark is hosting a Start Smart class in early November (please check our social media pages for the exact date, it is not yet scheduled). The class will be from 6:00pm-8:00pm at the Moorpark CHP Office at 610 Spring Rd. in Moorpark. This is a FREE class offered to current and prospective teenage drivers and their parents/guardians to discuss important issues such as tips on how to avoid crashes, safe driving habits, dynamics of a crash, consequences of a poor choice behind the wheel, parental roles and responsibilities, and legal and civil liabilities. Call the Moorpark CHP office to reserve your spot at (805) 553-0800.
- CHP Moorpark will be focusing patrols on distracted driving violations during
 Distracted Driver Awareness Week, October 21st through October 27th. Anything
 that diverts our attention away from driving, however slight, is a distraction. Safe
 driving requires 100% of our attention 100% of the time.
- The California Highway Patrol will be conducting a Maximum Enforcement Period (MEP) over the Thanksgiving Holiday weekend. The MEP will run from Thursday, November 28th through Sunday, December 1st. A focus for this MEP will be seatbelt violations.
- The California Highway Patrol is hiring 1,000 officers to help make California's roadways safer. If you or someone you know would like to join the CHP, visit www.betheCHP1000.com for more information and to speak with a local recruiter. Also, the CHP is hiring more than just officers. We are currently looking to fill 165 dispatcher vacancies across the state and are also looking for Commercial Vehicle Inspection Specialists to inspect the growing number of commercial vehicles on California highways. The CHP will provide you with the training for all three of these positions. More details and applications can be found at www.chp.ca.gov.
