 - Leisure village resident who came to talk about the 45 mile an hour signs that slow traffic. Something needs to be done about taking the signs down.
- 8. Office of Ventura County Supervisor Jeff Gorell's Comments Brief announcements and report on County activities.
 - Supervisor spoke about the 120 water perverters in the County. The issue with the Mountain Fire was not with this provider it was with some of the smaller purveyors especially in the Camarillo Heights area that do not have the infrastructure to support large fire like the Mountain Fire. Every home that was destroyed was in my district and we heard about the issues with water and the issues in the Heights. We have ordered an analysis to look into the issue due to the impact it had during the Mountain Fire, and we are going to look at every small purveyor in the area to get a better understanding of the risk levels with each purveyor. Also looking onto the non-potable situation because of the nurseries and the farmers who could not water plants.
 - Looking into developing an Evacuation Plan for Santa Rosa Valley. I came out and saw the traffic issues first hand and I have talked with Patrick

- Maynard from our Emergency Response Director. Looking at creating traffic control during times in danger. We are looking at doing an exercise to practice and developing a plan going forward.
- Awarded Kevin Cannon with a commendation for his service to the Santa Rosa Valley MAC and the community.
- Supervisor Gorell welcomed new MAC member Debra Spafford to the Santa Rosa Valley MAC who will begin serving her term starting in January of 2025.
- **Jeff Gorell** mentioned that Ribbon Cutting event to celebrate the pedestrian and bicycle enhancements was moved to January 6, 2025, due to the recent Mountain Fire.

9. Council Comments -

- Chair Rosemary Allison: No Comments.
- Vice Chair Amy Elliott: Asking the community to help with properties not being taken care of. I feel it is very important to address this due to the fire danger.
- Mark Burley: Commented on the meeting with Verizon generator has been rescheduled due to the Mountain Fire.
- **Kevin Cannon**: Spoke on the email from Dave Fleisch and the complication of the traffic lights. If a light goes out it affects the whole system. The signals have not been synchronized during the recent road construction. Only synchronized during peak hours. He also provided a brief history and reason why the Yellow 45-mile hour signs were incorporated to inform people about the synchronization.
- Michael Adams: Received an evacuation order even though his house was clearly not in danger. I would like the ask County to provide more granular and not affect those not affected by the fire.

11. Ventura County Fire Department

This month, Ventura County experienced its first large fire of the year. The Mountain Fire burned more than 20,000 acres, destroyed nearly 200 homes in Camarillo and forced hundreds of residents to evacuate. The Ventura County Fire Department was supported by numerous agencies from across the state in responding to the fire. Those efforts are still underway at the time of this report. We are grateful for their assistance.

- A Local Assistance Center was being set up to guide residents and businesses affected by the fire through the recovery process and share information about assistance that might be available. Additional information will be available at vcrecovers.com.
- Once conditions enabled property owners to return to their properties, eight Community Patrols were established to assist in sorting through the remains of burned homes for items that might have survived. Those firefighters wore personal protective equipment so they could work safely in the ash and debris, which also allowed the property owners to stay safe.
- Additional Santa Ana wind events are bound to happen. Everyone should remain vigilant about avoiding activities that could start a fire, such as a hot muffler against tall weeds, a dragging tow chain, a tossed cigarette or an outdoor fire pit.

INCIDENT SUMMARY

- On 11/15/2024, Cal Fire Incident Management Team 5 demobilized and transitioned full command of the incident back to the Ventura County Fire Department.
- As of this evening, updated mapping of the fire revealed a reduction in size to 19,904 acres with 91% containment.
- Ventura County Fire Personnel will continue mop-up work over the next week to achieve 100% containment.

WATERSHED ASSESSMENT

- Personnel from the California Conservation Corp have been requested to support a Watershed Protection Mission. The purpose of this mission will be to place erosion control devices on parcels with destroyed structures to prevent runoff and/or containment during a rain event. Equipment and crews are being mobilized and will begin work soon.
- The Cal Fire Watershed Emergency Response Team continues to gather data on impacts the fire has caused to the local watershed. This report will take several weeks to produce.
- Several local agencies will assemble the first week of December to complete
 a local watershed assessment. The purpose of this assessment is to better
 understand the post-fire debris flow risk, determine mitigation strategies and
 create evacuation plans.

OTHER RECOVERY EFFORTS

- On 11/19 & 11/20, Ventura County Sheriff Emergency Services, Cal OES & the Small Business Administration personnel will be working jointly to verify reported damage to residential structures. The goal of this verification is to qualify Ventura County Residents and businesses for loan interest SBA loans.
- A total of 149 fire survivors have visited the Local Assistance Center (LAC) that opened on Thursday, November 14, 2024, at the Ventura County Office of Education in Camarillo. The LAC will continue to operate Monday-Saturday from 9am-7pm for residents and business owners impacted by the Mountain Fire to able to access recovery services.

 County and City of Camarillo staff continue to develop plans for a comprehensive debris removal program that will be made available to property owners with destroyed structures. RECEIVED AND FILED

13. Camrosa Year-end review and Report on the Events Surrounding the Mountain Fire.

General Manager, Camrosa Water District, Norman Huff provided a year-end review of Camrosa Water District, and a report on the events surrounding the Mountain Fire and its impact to the Yucca Drive pump station.

- Spoke about: The morning of the fire we received calls from our customers that they had no potable water.
- Commented on the two separate water systems which include potable and non-potable water. The non potable system is not a guaranteed system is not designed for fire protection, The fire protection comes from our potable water system. When a fire happens, the priority is to keep the potable system going to help keep hydrants up and running. There were no interruptions in potable water supply during the Mountain Fire. When we have Edison PSPS shut offs, we make sure our tanks are full because we may not have a reliable power source during a fire.
- During a large fire a million-gallon water tank being used by multiple fire units and hydrants can drain a million-gallon tank pretty quickly. We can connect to other water sources such as Cauegus when necessary, but it can take time which is why we fill our tanks.
- After power was turned on, we were able to get the Yucca Station up and going and restore water to fields and nurseries.
- Michale Adams said you cannot always rely on PSPS notifications.
 Norman Huff stated we were getting alerts on the winds from other sources. For some reason Edison did not issues PSPS but just shut the power off.
- Mark Burley stated that Edison is not a reliable power source, and we need other sources for power. Norman Huff said for the potable system we have back-up generators and if necessary, we could get generators at our disposal from Emergency Services.
- Comment from the audience that they have animals. Norman stated that you still have potable for your home. So, you should have water for the

- animals. May want to put lines with potable water to where the animals are located.
- Rosemary Allison asked is there a plan to put a generator at the Yucca Station that can be used during a fire? Norman Huff it's not just putting a generator at the Yucca station but along the whole supply chain in order to get the pressure you would need in case of a fire. The non-potable was never designed to be used as a source of water during fires.
- A member from the audience stated that watering large acreage using potable water with a hose is not solution for keeping orchards and fields supplied with enough water.
- Rosemary Allison made the point that with the frequency of fires we may want to look at upgrading the Yucca Station so that it can be used during a fire.
- Norman Huff stated most communities only have one water source unlike Santa Rosa Valley. The non-potable system was never designed to be a back-up to the potable system. When we look at upgrading the Yucca Station the Camrosa Water Board has to consider how to utilizes resources across an entire spectrum of users which include both urban and rural communities.
- Kevin Cannon asked about putting fire hydrants on the non-potable.
 Norman Huff stated there is not enough pressure in the non-potable system to drive hydrants.
- Norman Huff stated we are in the process of developing the Master Plan
 Development which is focused on reducing our reliance on imported water
 from wholesalers. Some projects include the development of new wells
 and looking at utilizing reverse osmosis. In addition, if we can treat water
 ourselves then that lowers the cost of importing water and increase out
 independence. As we refine the cost we may need to readjust the rates.
- Norman Huff stated that they are looking at connecting into some of the new developments that would help offset and save 220-acre feet a year and lower costs.

14. Update on Santa Rosa Valley Fall Harvest

Meaghan Shaffer and Vice Chair, Amy Elliott provided a follow-up report on the SRV Fall Festival that took place on October 26, 2024, in partnership with Santa Rosa Valley MAC, Ventura County District 2 Office and Stepping Stones Riding Program.

Spoke about:510 attendees. The event ran smoothly and was successful.
 People appreciated the low entry cost to attend and that there were no costs for the kids' games.

- Tricker Treats Trail was a lot of fun for the kids and could use more business next year to participate in this event.
- Amy Elliott stated that we now have more time to try and get more vendors. The only comment I received was that we would like the food to be closer to those vendors selling merchandise.
- All in all, everyone agreed that it was a huge success for the first year and it helped build community support.

15. Assignment of MAC Members to Sub-Committees and Initial Identification of Goals & Objectives for 2025

- MAC Members and the public had a chance to discuss which committees they would like to serve on and started the process of developing goals in the following areas:
 - Public Health & Safety

- The process will carry over to the January MAC meeting to begin finalizing the 2025 work plan.

Summary Points Verizon Meeting - December 11, 2024

Meeting took place with members from Verizon, Bridlewood HOA, Santa Rosa Valley MAC, Public Works and Supervisor Gorell's Office.

Summary Points from the Meeting:

- 1. There will be new access doors constructed on the westside of the bunker to avoid encroachment or impeding equestrian riders using the trail. Existing access doors will be welded shut.
- 2. Signage to be created with wording warning riders that "Generator May Come on at Any Time."
- 3. A new water flowline will be created to divert surface water to flow around on the southside of the bunker so that water does not pool near the bunker or vault.
- 4. The trail will be leveled with DG material to enhance drainage to the southside of the bunker. Verizon will complete the work of leveling the trail and supplying the DG.
- 5. The owner of the property has been given a form by Public Works to authorize the work to be completed on his property. As of now the form has not been signed by the owner.
- 6. Even if the owner does not sign off, Verizon can complete the new flowline to divert the surface water without encroaching on his property.
- 7. Verizon will come up with a plan to improve the aesthetics of the bunker. Currently placing a hedge/shrub on the eastside of the bunker appears to be the best suggestion.
- 8. Maintenance will be performed at 6:00 AM on Wednesdays, every other week for approximately 15 minutes.
- 9. The loading of diesel fuel will be done from Santa Rosa Road. Verizon will need an Administrative Permit to authorize the work to be done from Santa Rosa Road. In order to be approved for the permit Verizon will submit a traffic plan to the County as part of the application for the permit.
- 10. It was agreed by the President of the Bridlewood HOA Walt Smith and MAC Member Mark Burley that the noise level of the generator was acceptable and would not present a nuisance to the community or a safety hazard to riders.
