Welcome to the meeting of the Santa Rosa Valley Municipal Advisory Council (MAC) an advisory council for the unincorporated area of Santa Rosa Valley to Ventura County Supervisor Jeff Gorell.

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Public comment is the opportunity for members of the public to participate in meetings by addressing the Santa Rosa Valley Municipal Advisory Council in connection with one or more agenda or non-agenda items. Public comments by a member of the public at a single meeting are limited to a cumulative total of five minutes at such meeting unless the time allotment is increased or decreased by the Chair depending on the number of speakers. The public comment period during the opening part of the meeting to address non-agenda items is limited to 30 minutes total for all speakers; this 30-minute limit does not apply to items on the agenda.

To maintain a public meeting environment conducive and welcoming to receiving public comments from all members of the public, the audience is discouraged from engaging in displays of support or opposition to staff reports or public comments, including clapping, yelling, booing, hissing or cheering, that may create a disruptive environment for members of the public wishing to participate. Any person who disrupts or impedes the orderly conduct of a meeting will be instructed to cease the disruptive conduct. Failure to do so may result in that person being removed from the meeting.

Members of the public who would like to augment their comments with visual or audio presentations must submit their materials to the israel.rodriquez@ventura.org for review at least 48 hours before the meeting. The review will be conducted to determine only whether the materials are on matters within the jurisdiction of the Municipal Advisory Council, would be disruptive of the meeting, or would foster illegality, such as identity

10. Ventura County Fire Department:

- The Ventura County Fire Department is scheduled to start carrying whole blood in its rescue ambulances in April. This program will allow paramedics to start transfusions for bleeding patients before they reach the hospital, increasing the chances of survival for seriously injured people.
- Firefighters are scheduled to start moving into new Fire Station 34 in Thousand Oaks on March 10. Some concrete work remains to be completed, but operations will be possible while that work continues. A grand opening celebration could take place sometime in May.
- VCFD has received four new Type III Brush Engines, which are now being outfitted with radios and other equipment. Engineers also will receive training on the new apparatus before they are deployed to the field. The new engines are 4-wheel-drive, enhancing the department's wildland firefighting capabilities. These four are the first in an 11-engine order. The rest are currently scheduled to arrive over the next 12-18 months.

- The VCFD Awards is scheduled April 24 at the Thousand Oaks Civic Arts Plaza, Scherr Forum Auditorium. In addition to firefighter of the year awards in each battalion and employee of the year awards for each bureau, the department will honor civilians and public safety personnel for lifesaving acts, meritorious service, and to four individuals, medals of honor – the highest honor the department bestows.

 - Speaker: Ken commented on a property that needed clearing and thanks **Mark Burley** for making it happen. **Marky Burley** commented that **Debra Spafford** made a call, and they cleared it right away. It was a team effort.

Rosemary Allison also commented on all that **Mark Burley** does including the work on the trails

- Speaker: **Bill McMahon** lives on Jennifer Place and is concerned on the channel behind his property that is being cut down and worried that in the event of a big water flow it would overwhelm the channel and spill into the homes.
- Speaker: **Kristen Fry** lives in Bridlewood and is concerned about connectivity when the PSPS happen, the impact to the traffic lights and her connectivity with Verizon cell service. **Rosemary Allison** commented that she has Starlink that activates when she loses service from Verizon.
- Speaker: **Susan** commented that it took an hour and forty-five minutes even though there was no emergency. All this because the traffic lights were out. **Supervisor Gorell** commented that he has been working with Sheriff to immediately respond in evacuation situations and provide traffic control to help evacuate quickly.
- Speaker: **Steve Fox** commented on Spectrum that goes out, so he purchased Dish Network during times of shutoffs. It is more stable since it does not rely on an internet connection.

9. Office of Ventura County Supervisor Jeff Gorell's Comments – Brief announcements and report on County activities.

- We celebrated the opening of the new bike lane in Santa Rosa Valley! The road was widened to provide more space for cyclists, along with a newly enhanced rumble strip for added protection.
- Strong winds continue to be a concern. As you know, there was a fire in the park, and multiple units, along with two helicopters, responded swiftly. Crews remain on high alert and are actively monitoring the situation.
- County Parks leased space to EJ Harrison, but unfortunately, some trash was left behind. County Parks and Public Works stepped in to clean up the debris.
- My office is organizing a community trash cleanup along Santa Rosa Road—date to be determined. Stay tuned for details!
- I am honored to have been elected Vice Chair of the Board of Supervisors this year and look forward to the possibility of being voted Chair next year.
- I am beyond frustrated with Edison. I once had a great deal of respect for the company, but since restructuring, they have strayed from their core mission of providing reliable, efficient service and excellent customer care. When I first became Supervisor, Edison provided a report listing planned infrastructure improvements, including hardening the Morganstein Line—a crucial power source for most of Santa Rosa Valley. None of those promises have been fulfilled.

- Edison's failure to follow through has forced me to act. I have introduced legislation to explore the possibility of establishing a locally operated, private municipal utility district—an option permitted under California law. Cities like Burbank, Sacramento, and Riverside have successfully implemented similar models, and voters in San Diego are currently considering the same.
- PSPS (Public Safety Power Shutoff) events were intended as a last resort, yet their frequent and extended use is now causing more harm than good. We are seeing increased road accidents, businesses being forced to close, and farmers struggling to irrigate their crops. One of the most alarming cases involved Dani Anderson, our County Representative, who relies on a wheelchair. She was trapped in her building for three days due to inoperable elevators—despite being promised advance notice to evacuate before the shutoff occurred. This is unacceptable, and change is urgently needed.

10. Council Comments

- **Chair Rosemary Allison:** Read Kevin Cannon's email on the signal. Each signal has a battery back-up. Economic Forecast presentation coming up. February 7th, TO Rotary.
- **Amy Elliott:** Met with Park Camp Host on the suspected arson fire in the park. Also spoke with Jeri Cooper from Stepping Stones Riding. Jeri was aware of the incident, and she is having all the Pepper Trees trimmed so that the view of hikers can clearly be seen. This is also a good time to encourage your neighbors to cut down brush and remove potential fuel for fires.
- **Mark Burley:** Comment that we need a better battery backup system for the traffic signals. At 3 am it is pitch dark and can easily lead to car accidents due to lack of visibility. Mark also commented on the arson attempt at Santa Rosa Park and asked if there any ordinances, county or park rules for not using fire pits during high winds. Firewise Community meetings are being conducted and progress is being made.
- **Michael Adams:** Traffic signals only have enough reserve back up power for eight hours. Either generator or solar power is necessary to charge the batteries for the lights during PSPS shutoffs. I would like to see the County look into those options for the traffic lights. Commented that he does not like the noise pollution from the rumble strips or the noise the Bot's Dots make by the school.
- **Debra Spafford:** No Comments

12. Ventura County Fire Department – January 2nd, 2025

- In 2024, Ventura County residents concerned about fire danger quadrupled the number of Firewise USA communities in our county. At the start of the year, there were six communities recognized for best practices by Firewise USA. Now, Ventura County has 25, beating the fire department's goal by one. When communities work together, they can have an even greater impact in reducing the risk from wildfires.
- The possibility of high Santa Ana winds continues. Everyone should remain vigilant about avoiding activities that could start a fire, such as a hot muffler against tall weeds, a dragging tow chain, a tossed cigarette or an outdoor fire pit.
- The fire departments of Ventura County, along with dozens of community partners, collected and distributed toys to more than 30,000 needy children during the holidays as part of the Spark of Love campaign.

Debra Spafford spoke about the viability of a number of safe zones that could be used as evacuation areas for people with large animals.

Santa Rosa Valley 2025 and 3-5-Year Plan Overview

1. Vision Statement: (Sample)

To live in a community where it is safe, fun, and the perfect place for kids to grow up and for people to find their forever home where they can retire and enjoy the benefits of a rural lifestyle.

2. Goals in support of the Vision Statement: (Sample)

- Maintain our low crime rate in our communities and parks.
- Support and maintain our excellent school Santa Rosa Technology Magnet School
- Create and maintain safe riding and hiking trails.
- Continue to improve our local park making a great place to hike, bike, and ride horses.
- Ensure that our air is safe and clean to breathe.
- Encourage and enhance our community spirit in Santa Rosa Valley.
- Make Santa Rosa Valley fire safe and prepared in the event of a wildfire.
- Ensure clean safe, and efficient road systems through the community.
- Work to establish reliable energy and cell service in Santa Rosa Valley.
- Deter and prevent homelessness coming in our neighborhoods, arroyos and parks.

3. The role that the MAC along with Sub-Committees and Ad-Hoc Committees perform in order to achieve the above stated goals and vision of Santa Rosa Valley.

a. The Role of the Santa Rosa Valley:

The Santa Rosa Valley MAC is an elected body whose responsibility according to their state mandate is to advise the County Supervisor on matters as outlined in CAGOV on:

- **Public Safety**
- **Public Health**
- **Planning**
- **Public Works**
- **Community Welfare**

b. Sub-Committees:

The creation of sub-committees is a planning tool to help align goals and objectives with the above-mentioned areas that the state has outlined as a scope of responsibilities for MAC Members. Three sub-committees have been established as a result and are as follows:

- **Sub-Committee on Public Safety & Health**
- **Sub-Committee on Planning & Public Works**
- **Sub-Committee on Community Welfare & Relations**

c. The Nature of Sub-Committees:

Sub-committees are long-term and ongoing in nature. Sub-committees are subject to the Brown Act requiring a quorum of the MAC Members be present, an agenda available, and meeting notification posted publicly 72 hours prior to the meeting taking place. The posting must be done at the location of the meeting and publicly on County websites, and Constant Contact lists where community members have opted in for updates and notifications.

In order to ensure compliance, the sub-committees have been rolled into regularly scheduled Santa Rosa Valley MAC meetings where posting has normally occurred, and a quorum is required in order to conduct the meeting.

MAC Members can choose to take the lead in a specific sub-committee, i.e. Public Safety & Health, but all MAC members oversee all three sub-committees as part of the meeting to ensure a quorum and can vote as a body on matters concerning sub-committees and ad-hoc committees. As part of each MAC meeting time on the agenda will be set-aside to report on matters occurring in each sub and ad-hoc committees.

d. Ad-Hoc Committees

The purpose of ad-hoc committees is to carry out the specific objectives that are necessary to achieve a goal established in one of the three sub-committees. Because Ad-hoc committees are project oriented they do not require a quorum or are subject to the Brown Act agenda and 72 hour posting requirements. What this means is that no more than two MAC Members may participate in an ad-hoc committee. Once three MAC Members become involved in an ad-hoc committee then the Brown Act requirements must be met.

This allows for ad-hoc meetings to take place in homes, restaurants or wherever they have decided to meet. They are more agile and flexible in nature. However, it is important to understand that ad-hoc committees come under one of the sub-committees and cannot act a separate body in regard to voting or making comments that would be outside or in contention with the MAC and it's established goals and plan. Ad-hoc committees work in harmony with the MAC 3-5-year plan and the sub-committees.

e. Example of How Sub-Committees & Ad-Ho Committees Work Together

As an example, the **Sub-Committee on Public Safety & Health** has set a goal of making SRV a fire safe and prepared community. In order to achieve this goal objectives which are measurable and actionable steps are established. Out of this goal two objectives have been established. **First objective** is to help harden each home and community in SRV in order to mitigate and minimize the loss of structures and lives in

the event of a wildfire. **A second objective** was established to develop an evacuation plan for residential neighborhoods and safety zones for those who have large animals.

f. Tactics and Action Planning:

Tactics and action planning are more detailed steps that are put into play in order to achieve bench marks necessary to accomplish an objective. In this case we had two objectives that came out of the goal of making SRV a fire safe and prepared community. In order to achieve these objectives, the following action steps could be established as an example.

- **Objective #1 Harden Each Home & Community in SRV in order to minimize loss of structures and lives in the event of a wildfire:**
 - i. **Tactic/Action Item:** Establish an ad-hoc committee to form a Firewise/Fire Safe Council to earn our Firewise certification and receive grant money for helping to promote and encourage participation of hardening homes.
- **Objective #2 Develop an Evacuation Plan for residential neighborhoods and safety zones for those with large animals.**
 - i. **Tactic/Action Item:** Establish an ad-hoc committee to study and work with the various departments to come up with a workable plan to ensure quick evacuation of people and moving animals to safety zones.

Summary Overview:

- **Vision Statement: MAC Members Create the Vision statement**
 - **Goals:** MAC Members establish Goals for each of the Sub-Committees
 - **Objectives:** MAC Members establish goals and objectives to create a coherent plan to achieve goals.
 - **Tactics/Action Plans:** Ad-hoc committees may be established with no more than two MAC members per ad-hoc committee to achieve action steps and bench marks towards achieving goals and objectives.
- **Substitutive Items and Matters:** Require a vote by MAC Members at regularly scheduled meetings where a quorum takes place. Items requiring a vote or overall discussion should be listed on the MAC agenda for the public to see.
- **Ad-hoc Committees:** An agile way of meeting, making action plans, and working towards objectives as long as no more than two MAC members serve on the ad-hoc committee.
- **The office of Supervisor Gorell:** Will be working a creating a template that makes it easier to identify goals, objectives, and action plans that can be incorporated in an over 3-5-year plan.

Dear Santa Rosa Valley Community Members,

I hope this email finds you well.

I wanted to share some recent information regarding planned improvements for the Morganstein Circuit. The map below was provided by Edison and highlights a section labeled "Rule 20A." Edison's Rule 20A is a provision established by the California Public Utilities Commission to convert overhead electric facilities to underground systems, enhancing both community aesthetics and public safety. This rule basically took a portion of ratepayer funds and allocated them for what's been labeled as beautification projects. Rule20A has ended but there's still a small portion of funding that has been allocated for some improvements.

The circled 20A area on the map indicates where Edison plans to make improvements with that funding. I will provide additional details as they become available. Additionally, please take note of the red arrows marked "Planned Covered Conductor." I am working to gather more information on the timeline and specifics of these planned upgrades.

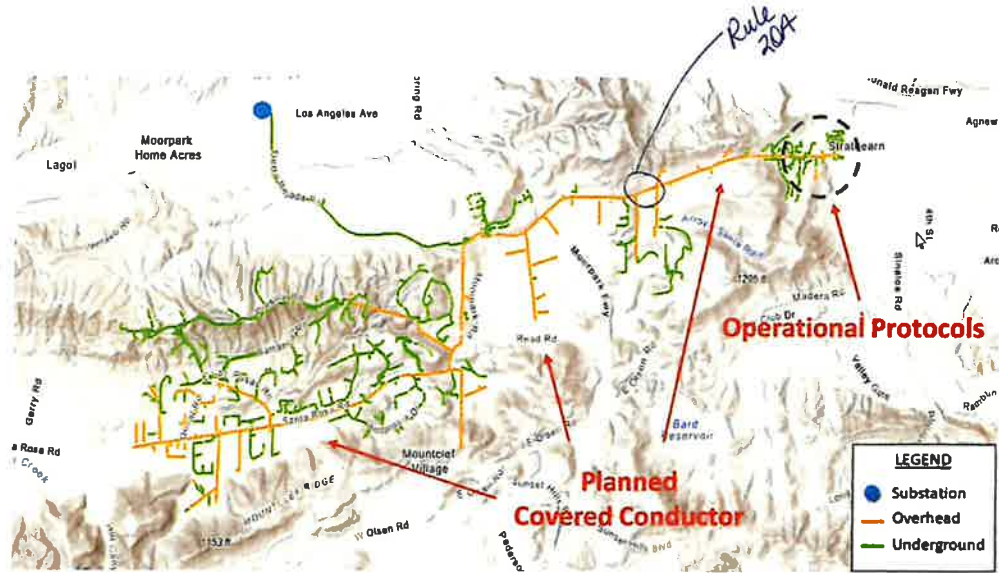
