1. Call to Order - The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by Chair Nick Fotheringham (Thousand Oaks COA).

- 3. Approval of Area Agency on Aging Advisory Council Meeting Minutes The minutes of the June 11, 2014, meeting were approved. (Tatangelo/Silberberg/Passed)

#### 4. Public Comments -

<u>Elizabeth Renteria</u> – Elizabeth introduced herself to the new members as the Outreach Coordinator and asked that they get in touch with her in order to get their picture for their Advisory Council badge taken.

<u>Brenda Birdwell</u> – Brenda is now working for the Braille Institute as their Adult Services Manager, She explained about the services that they offer in the community.

<u>Ann Springer</u> – Ann introduced herself as the business development manager for the Camarillo Health Care District. She spoke about the Healthy Attitudes magazine and the renovation of CHCD's adult day care center.

<u>Paul Boog</u> – Paul spoke about the deterioration of Port Hueneme's beaches and the efforts to save them. He encouraged those that were interested to attend a coastal commission hearing.

<u>Phil Chandler</u> – Phil introduced himself to the Council as working for the home care agency Right at Home. He spoke about the USC Center for Body Computing and a current study on heart health that advisory council members could become a part of.

<u>Smita Dandekar</u> – Smita spoke about current classes being offered at Simi Valley Senior Center that are free and open to all such as chair yoga.

<u>Kathleen Ahern</u> – Kathleen notified the group about a fundraiser on July 20 at the Anacapa Yacht Club for disabled veterans.

<u>Marty Kaplan</u> – Marty introduced himself as a Supervisorial Appointee and also the chair of the board of Caregivers. He invited all to an Art Exhibit at the Maritime Museum in Oxnard on July 9 to benefit Caregivers.

5. Consent Agenda Items – the consent agenda containing the Senior Nutrition Committee report from June 16, 2014, the Housing and Transportation Committee report from June 10, 2014 and the Outreach Committee report from June 24, 2014 were accepted. (Boog/Todd/Passed)

#### 6. Discussion Items/Presentation/Motion

6.1 Fall Prevention Program. Monique Nowlin gave a presentation on the new fall prevention program at the VCAAA in collaboration with Community Memorial

Hospital, Ventura County Medical Center, Ojai Valley Hospital, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), Ventura County Public Health, Ventura City Fire Department, Ventura County Fire, Livingston Memorial and Assisted Home Health. Due to the number of falls, the impact on the senior's health, and the increasing health care costs associated with them, the Ventura County Board of Supervisors has funded a Fall Prevention Coordinator position at the VCAAA. When a person over the age of 65 falls and 911 is called the person becomes part of the fall prevention program. The VCAAA Fall Prevention Coordinator, Carley Vailu'u, becomes the point of contact with EMS and the Emergency room doctor ultimately keeping track of fall assessment data, services recommended and received and measurable objectives. The advisory council had a lot of questions about the program and personal stories about the impact of loved ones falling in their lives. Due to the interest and importance of the topic, falls will be discussed at the September meeting as well with some initial program data being provided.

6.2 Advocacy and Marketing Discussion. Victoria Jump provided some information about what the Outreach Committee was working on and that this exercise would provide some needed guidance and input for the committee. Members and guests were broken up into small groups and asked to visit the seven (7) question stations around the room putting down their thoughts. After all groups had a chance to respond to all questions, each person was asked to place a colored dot on what they though was the most relevant response to each questions. - **1.** Call to Order The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by Ady Esparza, Committee Chair. A quorum was present.
- 2. Welcome and Introductions Introductions were made to the new Outreach Committee Member, Neill Spector.
- 3. Public Comments No public comments.
- **4.** Election New Chair No election was held. There was no quorum. Election for the new Chair is scheduled for the next Outreach Committee meeting in September.
- 5. Review Advisory Council July 2014 Activity The committee members reviewed the Advisory Council (AC) July 2014 Activity question exercise. It was concluded

from them that the message from the A.C. is in line with the VCAAA Area Plan of seniors remaining independent. The conclusion from the exercise is that the A.C. members would like to see more advocacy and more commitment from the entire A.C. with encouragement in "taking back" information to their Councils on Aging. It was suggested that the VCAAA have quarterly meetings for all the Councils on Aging. Neill brought up his concern for Vets living in their car. The idea was tabled for a future meeting.

6. Marketing Plan Discussion – In reviewing the marketing plan and evaluating the SWOT (strength, weaknesses, opportunities and threats) and building awareness it was noted that the perception of the VCAAA is that we are just another senior agency in the community and not a government agency with free services. It was also noted that the community perception of "free" is sometimes seen as being of low quality without a staff of professionals. Another problem is that people are only coming to the VCAAA in times of emergency. It was suggested that as a part of the marketing plan we need to take a look at the positive aspects of being a senior and not just coming to VCAAA when in need. Part of the messaging would be to put a different spin on aging by emphasizing nutrition, good health, exercise classes, and dealing with a positive message about senior interest and hobbies. Take a fresh look and highlight the different stages of aging by drawing interest and encouraging people to utilize our services.

Another noted issue is that seniors don't see themselves as seniors. One possible way of outreaching to them is by highlighting identifiers such as "If you were born before..." and by emphasizing what VCAAA provides. The committee suggested that we could also consider an advisory or mentor service, or by sending out the message of independence, advocacy, fresh meals, prevention, and high quality services.

The committee worked through the "Customer Analysis" spreadsheet portion of the marketing plan and the best way to communicate with our customer. The committee completed the Customer Analysis and the updated plan will be sent to the committee before the next meeting in September. The committee's "homework" for the next meeting is to review part C, "Marketing Objectives and Goals", of the marketing plan and come up with ideas for different messaging. Monique distributed a VCAAA Social Media flyer (attachment A) informing the committee of the newly rolled out social media for the agency; twitter, Facebook, and Instagram.

- 7. Other Committee Involvement/Notification Chairs of other VCAAA committee are encouraged to continue attending to provide input to the overall agency marketing plan.

Further, Ms. Hughes offered her services via establishing a "watch list" for legislation the Committee wants to follow. Upon request from Committee Members, Ms. Hughes provided input on the Legislative Update the Committee is creating. She said it is an excellent idea. Her ideas were as follows: keep it one page, add a version date, add the website, find a way to interest the legislature, perhaps create a Legislative Update for each topic of interest, as opposed to trying to place many topics in one communication piece. Ms. Hughes offered to review the Update upon request. Lastly, it was requested that Ms. Hughes come and speak to the Committee again and she stated it would be her pleasure to come as often as the Committee would like to have her present. Nick, suggested that she at least come speak to the Committee annually.

- 1. Call to Order The meeting was called to order at 9:04 a.m. by Acting Chair, Mel Silberberg. Although a quorum was present, it was decided by the members that Mel would continue in the role of Acting Chair until the full committee was present and could vote on a new Chair for this year.

- 1. Welcome and Introductions
- 2. Public Comments None
- 3. Election of New Chair for Committee A quorum was not present so this action was tabled to the September meeting.
- 4. Update on Project Goals Related to Food Insecurity
  - A. My Plate and Healthy Eating Project Placemat Patti Jaeger shared the latest mockup of the "Your Plate" placemat, which included a recipe comprised of ingredients that can be purchased at the \$.99 store or similar type of store. The placemat will change each month. It will be distributed to approximately 3000 people per month including home delivered meal participants, congregate meal participants, and Senior Share Program (formerly known as Brown Bag)

participants. It will measure 11" x 17". It is intended to be a usable visual teaching tool. The Registered Dietitians will create the monthly recipe. Ingredients from a discount store were chosen because many seniors by food there. Patti stated, "We want to show that you can eat healthy on any budget."

The placemat will also be on the VCAAA website. A small batch of Spanish language placemats will be distributed to meal sites where there is a larger Spanish-speaking population (Piru, Fillmore, Oxnard and Santa Paula). The group responded enthusiastically to the placemat concept. Susan Haverland suggested there might be a recipe contest among seniors that resulted in the award of gift cards to a discount food store.

B. SNAP-ED Grant Activities - Patti Jaeger updated the group on activities related to the new Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education (SNAP-ED). She explained it is a component of the Cal-Fresh program and includes evidence-based nutrition and exercise. Two presentations have been done and more are scheduled in July. The emphasis for exercise and nutrition go hand-in-hand.

Patty shared that she is looking at more venues to present the program. Susan Haverland suggested low income senior housing projects. For Senior Nutrition Program meal sites to qualify for SNAP ED presentations, 50% or more of the participants at the site must be eligible for Cal Fresh. Today, six areas qualify for SNAP ED, however, the Simi Valley site is not one of them because only 49% qualify for Cal-Fresh. They need 13 more participants to report as being 'low income.' A discussion followed about the importance of Senior Nutrition Program Meal participants accurately reporting their income on the meal intake forms and not selecting the option "declined to state" relative to their income.

C. Food Share Food Truck Collaboration - Susan Haverland shared the background on how the Port of Hueneme decided to give Food Share funding for a food truck. The full commercial kitchen trailer is expected to be ready in three months. They are seeking a healthy food chef who will also be able to drive the vehicle. The roving truck will deliver food and provide food demonstrations/education at venues throughout the County. They will also be partnering with the Public Health bus. Food Share expects to make 150 visits per year to senior centers, etc. The first area of focus will be those venues in the City of Port Hueneme.

Susan said that Food Share literally gets tons of produce from the Port of Hueneme. Typically, this is produce that has been rejected by local markets for various reasons. She said the produce is distributed to "food deserts in Ventura County," i.e., locations where there are no major supermarkets and/or where there are pockets of individuals with low income.

- 5. Increasing Physical Activity at Every Age Goal:
  - A. Developing Evidence Based Exercise Classes in Each City Christine Voth stated VCAAA wants to develop an informational tool that would inform the senior community, including persons to be served by the new Fall Prevention Program, about evidence based physical activity classes in Ventura County.

Christine distributed a list of many such classes broken down by city. She said if a brochure was done (as the tool), the list would have to be pared down and only evidenced based classes could be listed. She asked if a brochure might be a good too; and the committee said yes.

Christine distributed copies of Older Americans Act Title III D Evidence Based Criteria and explained that there are currently three levels of criteria. However, in FY 2015-16, only one level - the highest level criteria will be permitted, which states and evidence based program must be: "Proven effective with the older adult population using experimental or quasi-experimental design; and fully translated in one or more community sites; and includes developed dissemination products that are available to the public." When asked, it was the consensus of the committee to only list programs in the brochure that meet the highest level criteria.

There was discussion about the classes listed in the handout, and that the list was incomplete. Jay Evans stated that the evidence based programs Silver Sneakers (available at sites in Ventura County) and Enhance Fitness need to be added to the list. (Bill Witt teaches 'Active Living Everyday' at Kaiser.)

Smita Dandekar recommended adding yoga, especially Yoga for Diabetes, which is taught at the Simi Valley Senior Center. Smita shared a program brochure and information about the value of yoga.

- B. Fall Prevention Program Grant Application Christine Voth told the committee about a new grant application that VCAAA has submitted (to the Administration for Community Living or ACL), which would augment the existing new Fall Prevention Program. If awarded, ACL funds (along with Title III D funds) would be used to provide evidence-based fitness classes such as Simplified Tai Chi throughout Ventura County. If awarded, VCAAA would have to roll out the project in September 2014.
- 6. The Disease/Condition Specific Support Groups Phil Chandler distributed a list that he created on disease/condition specific Support Groups in Ventura County. He said that support groups for stroke and heart health seem to focus on prevention; and, Alzheimer's groups focus on how to manage the disease. Regarding a heart support group for women, "Go Red for Women" has a website, but no local support group. Groups to be added to the list include one for Parkinson's and Oiai and Arthritis and Simi Valley.

Phil mentioned the statistics on page 2 of his handout are the latest such stats available. A recommendation was made to include grief support groups on the list.

  - D. Senior Nutrition Committee Patti Jaeger reported that Farmers Market coupons are being distributed now. Ventura County is #5 in the state for coupon redemption, which is excellent. Coupons may be used to purchase fruits, vegetables and honey. A question arose about some vendors in Simi Valley not accepting the coupons and/or limiting the use of the coupons. Patty stated she will talk to the Executive Director of Farmers Markets in Ventura County to address this issue.

Patti shared that she is working with Senior Nutrition Program cooks to develop new recipes and use new foods. She is encouraging the cooks to be creative. One of the new foods includes wild Alaska salmon.

Other Concept: Shopping List for 99 Cents Store (or similar vendor) Elizabeth Renteria provided three handouts regarding a videotape cooking show of the recipes to be featured on the "Your Plate" placement. A lively discussion ensued about the concept of having a "celebrity" chef prepare recipes on camera using low-cost foods. Elizabeth stated the \$.99 store has a video on its website but not a celebrity chef. The videos could be played on local access television, be viewed on the VCAAA webpage, and could be a featured program on Food Share's new food truck television.

Other – Health Issues Committee Goals - Christine Voth distributed a worksheet listing the committee's current long-term goals. She reviewed the status of each goal. For homework, she asked the committee to review the list and develop a new goal to be finalized at the November meeting. The new goal will need to fit with the other goals and have a realistic timeline.

- **1.** Call to Order The meeting was called to order at 10.05 A.M. by Toni Olson. A quorum was present.
- 2. Welcome and Introductions New committee members Vicki and Jay were welcomed by the Chair.
- 3. Approval of Minutes from the 6/16/2014 Meeting This motion to approve the minutes was made by Vivian Johnson, seconded by Jay Evans and approved unanimously with no changes.
- 4. Public Comments None.
- 5. New Food Items Patti Jaeger advised that two new fish entrees, a selection of spices and a low sodium marinara sauce will be added to this year's food list. It is hoped that these additions with the recently introduce ground turkey will help the sites provide a more varied meal selection.
- 6. "Your Plate" Placemat The new paper placemat was shown to the committee by Patti Jaeger who also developed it. Each month a new one will be distributed to all meal sites.
- 7. Meal Count and Cost Per Meal through June 30, 2014 Staff reported 177,395 meals (14,782 per month) were served during FY 2013-14. This is 3% more than the

contracted meal count. The average food cost per meal (purchased from Jordanos) was \$3.70, or 3.4% lower than the budgeted amount of \$3.83.

8. Revised Funding Formula For FY2016-17 — Staff advised that the current funding formula consists of a minimum level of funding of \$20,000 for a site offering a congregate meal and \$15,000 for a site offering a home delivered meal. These amounts were developed based on the cost of staffing these sites at a minimum level in order to ensure that some of the smaller sites could be viable.

The remaining available funding (after the minimum level was allocated to each site) was divided up proportionally by % of meals served in prior years (when there was not a cap on the maximum number of meals served). The funding formula was developed quite a few years ago. This is being reviewed by the committee to see if a revised formula would be appropriate for the next four year contract - which will commence in July 2016 and for which an RFP will be issued around January 2016.

It was noted by staff that most of the sites are quite unique, and because of this, it is difficult to develop a truly comparable cost per meal per site:

- Some sites use volunteers to deliver meals, others use a contractor (Food Share, Inc.).
- Some sites deliver five frozen meals <u>once a week</u>, while other sites deliver a hot meal each day during the week.
- We know the cost of the food supplied (through Jordanos) and the grant funds provided to each site.
- We know the program income reported by each site.
- We know the amount of funds matched by each site's organization.
- We do not always know if a site receives additional funds (from their city or from another organization) for their meal program.

The committee will continue to work on developing a response to this issue at the next meeting.

9. Proposed Incentive Pool for FY 2014-15: In the June meeting, the committee voted unanimously to establish an incentive fund pool for FY 2014-15. The incentive pool will be available to serve additional meals (baseline services). Grantees that meet all contractual obligations will be eligible to participate in the incentive pool.

The unallocated funds which could be made available for the Incentive Pool are currently estimated to be **\$115,772**.

Additionally, the California Department of Aging announced on August 11, 2014 that \$46,586 in State one-time-only funds would be made available at the end of September 2014. These funds may not be spent on base-line services as these are one-time-only funds.

# The Older Americans Act: improving older adults' lives for 49 years

This month marks 49 years since President Johnson signed the Older Americans Act into law. In the 1960s, only 9 percent of the country's population was over age 65, but many of them lived in poverty. Today the demographics of aging are much different. There is less overall poverty among older adults, but the older population has grown exponentially, as has the diversity of their needs.

The Older Americans Act provides services for people in their communities. In 2012, the aging services network provided 8 million hours of adult day care; 2 million nutrition education sessions; and nearly 25 million rides to and from medical appointments, shops, and social events. With the help of hundreds of thousands of volunteers, the aging services network served more than 225 million meals, providing essential nutrition so hundreds of thousands of older adults can stay healthy.

Even as the population of older Americans has grown, funding for the Older Americans Act has remained steady over time. Despite varying economies in states through the years, the aging services network has effectively leveraged an average of \$3 for every dollar of federal investment. It has also maintained a steady corps of senior volunteers who share their time, experience, and resources with their neighbors and communities. ### HHS helps facilitate conversation on brain health

The topic of brain health can be complicated when talking with older adults. With an eye toward facilitating conversations with older people about brain health, new set of resource materials is now available from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

The four-part set of materials is written in plain language and explains what people can do to help keep their brains functioning best. Topics include: preventing falls to avoid head injury, refraining from excessively drinking alcohol, getting enough sleep, and managing diabetes and blood pressure. The basics of Alzheimer's



disease as a primary threat to brain health with age and managing possible risk factors are also explained in the materials. Although no activity or medicine has yet been shown to prevent the disease or reduce risk, some of the healthy lifestyle and chronic disease management strategies presented are good for healthy aging and may prove, with further research, to directly protect against cognitive decline and Alzheimer's disease.

The materials are intended for use at senior centers and in other community settings. "Staff and volunteers at senior centers, area agencies on aging, health departments, local clinics, and community organizations of all kinds are in a wonderful position to debunk myths and share accurate information about this subject," notes Kathy Greenlee, assistant secretary for aging and administrator of ACL. "Evidence-based resources like these can go a long way to make sure that people with concerns about brain health can get the information they need from the community caregivers they trust."

The Brain Health Resource contains: • A PowerPoint presentation that teaches older adults and their caregivers how to reduce risks related to brain health. • An accompanying Educator Guide that provides additional information for presenters to share with audiences. • A one-page handout for older adults and caregivers called "Brain Health as You Age: You Can Make a Difference! • A supplementary handout, Brain Health as You Age: Key Facts and Resources, that includes basic information and resources for the topics covered in the presentation.

# 2015 White House Conference on Aging planning begins

Discussions began yesterday at the White House around plans for the 2015 White House Conference on Aging (WHCoA). These decennial events are held to engage with stakeholders and individuals interested in aging about issues and areas important to older individuals and people in the aging field.

A 2015 White House Conference on Aging will coincide with the 50th anniversary of Medicare, Medicaid, and the Older Americans Act, as well as the 80th anniversary of Social Security. The event would be an opportunity to look ahead to the issues that will help shape the landscape for older Americans for the next decade. Issues that could be addressed at the event include:

<u>Retirement security:</u> Financial security in retirement provides essential peace of mind for older Americans, but requires attention during our working lives to ensure that we are well prepared for retirement.

<u>Long-term services and supports</u>: Older Americans overwhelmingly prefer to remain independent in the community as they age. They need supports to do so, including a caregiving network and well-supported workforce.

<u>Healthy aging</u>: As medical advances progress, the opportunities for older Americans to maintain their health and vitality should progress as well.

<u>The Elder Justice Act</u> was enacted as part of the Affordable Care Act, and we need to realize its vision of protecting seniors from scam artists and others seeking to take advantage of them.

No date or details have yet been determined for the 2015 WHCoA. The previous WHCoA was held in December 2005. The White House will launch <a href="https://www.whiteHouseConferenceOnAging.gov">WhiteHouseConferenceOnAging.gov</a> later this summer as the official conference site.

White House officials intend to use new technology, agencies' regional offices, partners, and other strategies to engage directly with older Americans and stakeholders on these issues.

# Why Not the Older Americans Act?

The American public's cynicism about Washington can diminish when bipartisanship prevails and bills become law. The most recent example of this was the signing into law of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act by President Obama yesterday, July 22. There are earlier examples including the reauthorizations of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) and the Farm Bill. As is the case with most legislation, none of these bills were perfect, but they contained sufficient bipartisan support to make it across the finish line.

So why is the reauthorization of the Older Americans Act not in this group? The law's name may not be recognizable for some, but many of the services the law provides and funds are widely recognized, such as Meals on Wheels, senior centers, elder abuse prevention and low-income community service employment.

This month the Older Americans Act (OAA) celebrates its 49th anniversary of becoming law. That makes it a longer-standing program than either the Workforce Act or VAWA. Over its history, the OAA has been one of the most effective programs ever enacted. It is a program which operates in every Congressional district. It saves Medicaid and Medicare considerable amounts of money through its services which allow older adults to remain in the community or at home, choices which are also preferred by older adults. It is a job creator and job retainer program in communities.

The law is now almost four years late in being renewed. There is no logical reason for this. The Senate has moved the process to the point where an excellent bill, S. 1562, has been voted out of the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee and awaits full Senate action. The House has two pending bills but no sign of any action.

The upcoming August recess is a special opportunity for grassroots advocates to communicate directly with their representatives in Congress. The message can be simple: renew the Older Americans Act because it is important to seniors in our community; the Act has more than proven its value and will continue to as our population ages.

Ed Walsh, Rancho Mirage The Department of Health and Human Services announced today that more than 8.2 million seniors and people with disabilities with Medicare have saved \$11.5 billion since 2010 due to changes made through the Affordable Care Act.

The news follows the recent release of the Medicare Trustees report, which indicates the life of the Medicare Trust Fund has been extended to 2030, up from its projection of 2017 in 2009, and Part B premiums are expected to stay the same for the second year in a row. Additionally, a new HHS report found that per capita, Medicare spending growth has averaged 2 percent over 2009 – 2012, and nearly 0 percent in 2013, one-third of the growth rate over the 2000-2008 period.

The Affordable Care Act makes Medicare prescription drug coverage more affordable by gradually closing the coverage gap, known as the donut hole, where beneficiaries had to pay the full cost of their prescriptions out of pocket before catastrophic coverage took effect.

According to HHS, more than 8.2 million seniors and people with disabilities with Medicare have saved over \$11.5 billion on prescription drugs since 2010 as a result of discounts in the donut hole and rebates in 2010, for an average of \$1,407.

In California, 139,965 Medicare beneficiaries have received a total \$951.9 million in discounts on prescription drugs as a result of the gradual closure of the coverage gap, including about \$123.6 million in 2014.
