1. Call to Order - The meeting was called to order at 9:05 a.m. by Vice-Chair Toni Olson (Simi Valley COA).

- Pledge of Allegiance Toni Olson led the Pledge of Allegiance. A quorum was present.
   Agenda Item #3
- 3. Approval of Area Agency on Aging Advisory Council Meeting Minutes The minutes of the January 14, 2015, meeting were approved as corrected. The corrections made were Donald Todd and Neill Spector being present at the meeting. (Boog/Gossom/Passed)

#### 4. Public Comments -

Blair Craddock with the Camarillo Health Care District spoke about the Evidence Based Health Coalition and that classes were being offered for Walk with Ease and A Matter of Balance. She provided a sample flyer and asked that if any of the senior centers wanted to host a class to contact her.

Phil Chandler with Right at Home spoke about Alzheimer's disease and dementia being a growing issue in the community and that there is technology available to help with the wandering that many people with these conditions experience. Right At Home has watches and shoe inserts for sale that track people.

Martha Shapiro with the Camarillo Health Care District Wellness and Caregiver Center spoke about the tools for caregiving classes that are being held. It is a 6 week series starting in May at the district. She left flyers on the table.

5. Consent Agenda Items – the consent agenda containing the Legislative Committee Report from January 14, 2015, Outreach Committee Report from January 27, 2015, Outreach Committee Report from February 24, 2015, Health Issues Committee Report from January 20, 2015, Senior Nutrition Committee Report from February 23, 2015, Optimal Aging Committee Report from January 28, 2015, and Housing and Transportation Committee Report from January 13, 2015, were accepted. (Evans/Todd/Passed). There were no abstentions.

#### 6. Discussion Items/Presentation/Motion

- 6.1 **FY 2015-2016 Strategic Plan Update Public Hearing.** The public hearing was called to order at 9:15 am by Toni Olson. Toni Olson, AC Vice-Chair opened the hearing. Martin Marquez was available to provide translation for Spanish speakers. Christine Voth provided a detailed presentation on the changes being made in the plan. Public testimony was provided by Blair Craddock, Monica Neece, Dina Ontiveras, Monica Schrader and Martha Shapiro. Written comments would be accepted until 5 pm on March 11, 2015.
- 6.2 Approval/Modification/Discussion of the VCAAA FY 2015-2016 Strategic Plan Update. There were no modifications of the plan requested by the council and the update as presented was approved. (Boog/Glasmeier/Passed) Discussion centered on the possibility of the AC revising the FY 2015-2016 plan based on recommendations heard via public testimony or written comments. As the document is a working plan, modifications can be made anytime via another public hearing. There were no abstentions.

- 6.3 Formation of a nominating Committee for Election of Officers, One (1) Service Provider and Five (5) Special Population Seats for FY 2015-2016. The nominating committee was formed with Marty Kaplan, Donald Todd and Rose Gossom volunteering.
- Planning and Allocation Committee Report and Recommendation to Provide a 6.41% Consumer Price Index Increase for Senior Nutrition Program Grantees, and to Approve FY 2015-2016 Grant Amounts for Unallocated Funds and to Direct Staff to Issue Sole Source Provider Notices and Requests for Proposals. Toni Olson corrected page 2 of the report under item 5a, stating that the amount of funding for the Ombudsman grant was \$128,875 not \$129,875. Recommendations approved as presented (Evans/Tripoli/Passed). Discussions centered on the cost of providing bi-lingual and bi-cultural services, how the CPI increase was calculated, and if we knew were knew that we had these funds for FY 2015-2016. Abstentions: Sylvia Stein and Sue Tatangelo.
- 6.5 Senior Nutrition Committee Report from January 12, 2015 and Recommendation to Allow Senior Nutrition Program Equipment Installation Costs to be Included in the One-Time -Only Requests and to be Reviewed on a Case by Case Basis. Recommendation approved as presented. what kind of equipment was included. Discussion centered on (Evans/Boog/Passed). Abstention: Sue Tatangelo.
- Ouarter 2 Quarterly Grantee and Direct Service Report. Brian Murphy went over the handout provided. He is attempting to make it user friendly for the committee and welcomed any suggestions. Questions/Discussion from the AC were as follows: if the grantee is over 100% in funding draw down are they expected to find other sources of money (no 100% of contract is the maximum we will pay); when a unit is not specified on the chart what does it mean (it is a rollup of categories which have different units of measurement); why do some grantees have 0 service units entered in some categories (corrective action plan (CAP) has been received regarding the issue and units will appear on next report); performance of grantees less than 90% (Corrective action plans are requested automatically for anyone with contract performance less than 90%); could we note if a CAP has been requested on the form (we could but anyone less than 90% has a CAP); why are some categories so far over, etc.

- 7. Advisory Council Meeting Schedule. The meeting schedule for FY 2014-2015 was included for informational purposes. Toni asked that if you cannot make a meeting to let staff know.
- 8. CSL/TACC Update the written report was included in the packet. Larry Hartmann gave a brief CSL update. Funding for CSL is in jeopardy due to people not donating on Line 427 of the CA state income tax form.
- 9. Committee Membership Selection for FY 2014-2015. Members were asked to review the list and make sure that their committee choices were reflected.
- 10. California Commission on Aging AgeWatch for January 2015. Included for informational purposes.
- 11.Comments from the Chair Toni thanked everyone for being attentive and asking great questions.

#### 12. Other Business -

Elizabeth Renteria - provided handout and told the committee that she was in the process of making plans to celebrate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Older Americans Act in May. She asked everyone to send her a picture of what they looked like in 1965.

- 1. Call to Order The meeting was called to order at 11:01 a.m. by Chair, Bill Witt. A quorum was present.
- 2. Welcome and Introductions Chair Bill welcomed the Guest Speaker Johnny Garcia Vasquez and provided the Committee with an overview of Mr. Vasquez's background.
- 3. Public Comments Bill distributed an article titled "Mental Illness Fund Not Tracked", The Star, January 28, 2015.
- 4. Special Guest Johnny Garcia Vasquez, Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin's Office Mr. Vasquez provided an overview of the various bills of interest to Assemblymember Irwin, i.e. AB171, AB489 and AB556. He discussed impending Sidewalk Sessions and upcoming Senior Scam Stopper workshops sponsored by Assemblymember Irwin on April 17<sup>th</sup> in Thousand

Oaks and May 29<sup>th</sup> in Camarillo. Sue stated that she would like to extend an invitation to Assemblymember Irwin or her staff to attend the LTSS Pathways meeting on April 9<sup>th</sup>. Victoria stated that we are looking for Assemblymember Irwin's support in matters regarding seniors and to look to VCAAA as a resource for aging and the impact of aging on various issues. There has been a systematic dismantling of the Older Americans Act and we are looking for support to reverse that. Victoria further queried on how VCAAA can be a resource and it was discussed that perhaps a Committee could be formed of seniors that meet with Assemblymember Irwin quarterly or monthly on senior issues.

- 5. Featured Legislative Committee Member Larry Hartmann Mr. Hartmann provided an overview of his background in the area of seniors, his personal and educational background. Larry grew up during World War II on a farm. By Age 11, Larry was driving and obtained his driver license at age 14. Larry was exposed to his first senior scam in his younger years when his 85 year old Uncle Frank was sold "government tractors" for ½ price and the tractors never showed up. The fact that someone would "scam" his Uncle and affect his family's livelihood shocked him and started him on the path to helping seniors. Larry has special education teaching credentials, administrative credentials and handicapped credentials. Larry has owned and operated a swim school for babies and handicapped adults. He started his career as a volunteer with the Upper Ojai Sheriff's group, during which time he helped find a dementia patient lost out in the cold night. Now, he works with real estate rentals for seniors, AARP Driver Courses for seniors, ARC and he grows pixie tangerines with his wife Pat (he brought some to share)....according to Larry, Ojai Pixies are sweet, petite and great to eat and he was right! Larry and Pat have 5 sons, 2 daughters and 15 grandchildren. The legislative issues Larry likes to focus on are as follows: Fall Prevention, Dementia Prevention, Senior Housing & Transportation, Senior Scams, Successful Retirement Strategies and Senior Health. The next Committee member to present their background will be June Glasmeier.
- **6. January 28, 2015 Article on Mental Illness Fund, The Star** The article had already been distributed. The Committee reviewed it and had brief discussion.
- 7. Budget Action California Association of Area Agencies on Aging/Debrief by Bill Witt on C4A Capitol Day Chair Bill Witt provided an overview on C4A Capitol Day that he attended with Monique Nowlin, Deputy Director. The overarching message from Bill was that it was a valuable trip to ensure that the legislature and the Governor's office remain aware of senior concerns, the funding shortfalls senior programs face and the fact that the Older American's Act has not been reauthorized. Bill further shared that it was communicated to those in attendance that there are no significant amount of monies earmarked for senior services at this time.

- 1. **Welcome and Introductions**. The meeting was called to order at 1:02 pm. A quorum was present.
- 2. Public Comments There were no public comments.
- 3. Worksheet for Committee Goals and Objectives Update
  - a. Evidence Based Exercise Classes: an update was provided on the evidence based classes. The leader training occurred at the end of February and six classes have been scheduled, with the first one starting in April. Committee members discussed advertising and reaching out to home health, discharge planners and geriatric doctors as referral sources. Additional discussion centered on considering the home bound, the faith based community, meals on wheel providers, IHSS and home care, volunteer organizations and training agencies. Regarding the purchase of materials, committee members were notified that the VCAAA plans to purchase materials needed for the class this fiscal year so that all funds next year can go to the classes. The existing goal related to the exercise

brochure has been changed. Committee members agreed that since the Evidence Based Health Coalition (EBHC) is updating the state website with all the classes, coupled with the fact that the classes will not be on set days and locations throughout the year, the existing evidence based health coalition brochure used for the chronic disease self-management program will be revamped to include all evidence based programs (A Matter of Balance, Chronic Disease Self-Management Program, Walk with Ease, Diabetes Self-Management and Pain Self-Management). EBHC will provide EB program specific flyers with times and locations of classes. Also discussed was the existing benefits current Medicare Advantage plans offered such as health club memberships. Staff will provide a listing at the next meeting. Finally, the committee approved moving forward with the optimal living club and has been tasked with bringing ideas to the next meeting as well as thinking about how to expand the classes and the club to the homebound senior.

- b. Review and approval of back of placemat the committee viewed a sample of what it would look like and made the suggestion to add another category for an exercise tip. Also discussed was the optimal living tip with suggestions to include crossword puzzles or cartoons.
- c. Dental project update staff provided a handout of work done so far on the dental resource list. Two new resources were suggested: United Way dental initiative and Denist.org. Staff will bring this item to the next meeting for the committee to decide on how they want to use the information.
- d. Food sharer Food Truck Collaboration Susan Haverland reported that the food truck (28 feet with a full commercial kitchen) has arrived and that they are in the process of scheduling it in the community. There will be a celebration on March 25 from 5:00 – 7:30 pm at Food Share that all are invited to attend. Once fully operational, Food Share intends for the truck to be on the road three days a week in low income neighborhoods doing recipe demos, produce distribution and outreach.
- e. Other Objectives Sue Tangelo discussed the Evidence Based Health Coalition and the April 9 "Pathways to Long Term Care Integration" being held at the VCAAA. Amber Cutler, Staff Attorney for Justice in Aging will be the speaker. She encouraged committee members to attend and provided a flyer on the event. Sue also provided handouts on other topics. Also discussed was the goal relating to the elder economic index and the potential to revise VCAAA participant information form to ask income in relation to the elder economic index, not just federal poverty level information. This can be used to demonstrate targeting of services to most in need.
- 4. Other Committee Involvement/Notification Information regarding the committee's activities will be shared with the outreach committee and optimal aging committee.

- 3. Approval of Minutes from the 1/12/2015 and 2/23/2015 Meetings The motion to approve the minutes from the above prior meetings was made. (Todd/Evans/Passed).
- 4. Meals Served Count and Cost Per Meal through February 28, 2015 The total meals served for the eight months through February 28, 2015 = 119,418 with 14,410 served in February. The average monthly meals served = 14,927. The actual meal count at February 28, 2015 is 103% of the contracted count. The YTD cost per meal for Jordano's supplied food is \$3.97.

- 5. Meal Site Funding Formula For Fiscal Year (FY) 2016-17 In preparation for the development of a revised meal site funding formula, this committee requested that staff provide additional information on the existing funding formula. Staff's response follows:
  - a. The Advisory Council approved a 6.41% increase (the cumulative CPI increase from July 2010 through December 2014) on March 11, 2015. This increase was applied to the baseline funding for FY 2014-15 and this increased baseline funding will continue for FY 2015-16.
  - b. Staff advised that the FY2009-10 meal site funding formula established four minimally funded sites so that the programs in smaller communities would be viable. There are four of these sites, three of which are funded at \$20,000 and one funded at \$15,000 (home delivered meal program only). After funding the smaller sites, the remaining funding was allocated among the larger site based on the number of meals they had contracted for.
  - **6.** Additional Data Request on Simi Valley Funding Allocation The committee directed staff to provide additional information on why the City of Simi Valley's meal site funding grew significantly from FY2009-10 to FY2014-15.
  - 7. Committee Meeting Schedule Staff provided feedback on the results of a survey sent to Committee members to determine convenient dates and times for future SNP Meetings. The committee decided to change the next meeting to April 13, 2015.
  - 8. VCAAA Emergency Meals: PAC Approved Freezer; Fridge needed Historically, food samples for the Senior Nutrition Program (SNP) were stored in a staff member's home freezer. A domestic freezer is not suitable for the storage of SNP food. County Environmental Health regulations only permit the commercial storage of SNP food.

Staff advised that the commercial freezer approved by the PAC in the amount of \$3,441 does not need to be purchased, because Camarillo HCD's old freezer (with a reconditioned compressor) was moved to the VCAAA office. Staff requested that the committee approve the unused \$3,441 OTO funding to purchase a commercial refrigerator. VCAAA will use this to store food samples, the non-frozen portions of emergency SNP meals and specialized meals for seniors on specialized diets such as:

- High calorie-high protein; High protein
- Modified carbohydrates
- Lactose-free; Gluten-free
- Renal diet in varying stages, including dialysis
- Dysphagia stages 1,2,3
- Sodium diet (2g and 3-4g
- Medically ordered double portions or large portions
- Supplements instead of whole meals, such as Boost, High Calorie, Boost Plus and Protein Shakes

The motion to allow VCAAA to purchase a refrigerator (with the previously approved OTO funding for a freezer) was made by Jay Evans, seconded by Donald Todd, and was passed unanimously.

**1. Call to Order** - Chairperson Toni Olson called to order the meeting at 10:04 a.m. A quorum was present.

#### Welcome and Introductions

- 2. Public Comments None
- 3. Approval of Minutes from the 3/16/2015 Meetings The motion to approve the minutes from the above prior meeting was made by Donald Todd, seconded by Vicki Tripoli, and was passed unanimously.
- 4. Meals Served Count and Cost Per Meal through March 31, 2015 Meal count is at 104% of contracted through the end of March, which means 135,950 have been served to date for nine months with 16,040 of that amount served in March. Jordano's-supplied meal count is 15,505 for March, and the non-Jordano's meal count is 535. YTD cost per meal for Jordano's-supplied food is \$3.81, with a total average cost per meal at \$3.97.

HELP of Ojai is eligible for the SNP incentive program, but did not apply to participate. They want to participate in this program now. RESOLVED: Vicki moved to approve that any eligible

site can participate in the incentive program. Donald Todd seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved.

Staff provided an update on some current research on how a specific restaurant voucher program works in Yuba City and how that might rate with Conejo Recreation and Parks District's Proposed Café Program, which is still in its planning stage.

5. Revised Funding Formula for FY2016-17 - Staff informed the committee on why HELP of Ojai was historically funded a much higher amount than the other sites. This site received additional funding, when they were preparing all of their meals from scratch, which meant they were not using VCAAA supplied Jordano's food at that time. Rather, they were purchasing everything locally. When they changed their program and began using Jordano's food, their funding went significantly down.

The committee's request is carried to the next meeting that staff provide additional information on why the City of Simi Valley's meal site funding grew significantly from FY 2009-10 to FY 2014-15.

6. HELP of Ojai Program Funding for Locally Prepared/Purchased Entrees - Staff raised the issue that the HELP of Ojai meal site believes their program is underfunded. HELP of Ojai makes from scratch roughly 250 meals per month on average, which is about 3,000 meals per year. This is the equivalent of about \$2 per Jordano's entrée portion (roughly \$6,000 per year). HELP of Ojai isn't always getting reimbursed for the cost of the food purchased locally, because many of those charges are booked to cash match. Were HELP of Ojai to get its food for these meals from Jordano's, those costs would be 100% covered and would not come out of their grant funds.

If the committee were to approve this, it was noted that other meal sites might also be looking for additional funds. Discussion continued about how many sites might have any real interest in this – currently, only City of Santa Paula and HELP of Ojai. Yet some sites are becoming more creative and might grow more interested in preparing their own meals through local food purchases. Next meeting staff will bring a chart to more clearly show HELP of Ojai's potential cost differences between Jordano's and purchasing food locally for meals.

7. Other Committee Involvement/Notification - Health Issues - Patti discussed the new monthly menu placemat with Nutritional Education programming elements expanded on the back. Info includes items such as exercise, a super food, senior scam, community resources, etc. Donald brought up an idea to add an element to warn pet owners of what animals should not eat. Patti will look into this.

Farmers' Market coupons have been funded for another year. VCAAA should be releasing them in June or July. Last year VCAAA ranked number four in the state out of 36 or 37 counties participating.

For seniors who qualify for CalFresh, SNAP-Ed is the new educational component, which (1) must be evidence-based and (2) must be nutrition and exercise combined. VCAAA is one of

seven counties in the state that received this grant funding and is implementing SNAP-Ed. As of July 2014, we have been implementing it at our meal sites. VCAAA is working on expanding the list of approved venues.

- 8. Other Business Staff brought to the Committee's attention that the Senior Nutrition Garden near FoodShare is being affected by a number of projects, including a solar panel project to power the juvenile justice building. Additionally, the citrus planters and asparagus plants in the Patio area must be removed for a new parking lot as part of a proposed project.
  - Patti advised that many new members have joined the S.N.A.C committee and suggested that a member of S.N.A.C. come to our SNP Committee Meetings, and that someone from our Advisory Council attend S.N.A.C meetings. Marleen will work with S.N.A.C. to look into Diamond Star Productions fundraising practices and will bring to the Committee this fundraising organization's script to make sure the public does not think they represent VCAAA.

- 3. Old Business: Update on OAC Teaser Tips. There was discussion of Teaser Tips for Aging Well for inclusion in the Senior Nutrition Program placemats beginning in April 2015. Sylvia Taylor Stein submitted ideas for tips to VCAAA. Staff shared a prototype of how the placement will appear and it was well received by committee members. L. Harasta recommended that Advisory Council members be given a copy of the monthly placements (as they become available) to take back and share with their local councils and commissions on aging.

- 6. New Business: What does optimal living/aging look like for a homebound person? How do we reach and involve them in activities to nurture their health and well-being for optimal aging? Due to the nature of being homebound, is it possible to involve them? Discussion began with the question, how do we identify the homebound people? This could be done through home health agencies, volunteer agencies that work with the homebound (such as Caregivers: Volunteers Assisting the Elderly), Senior Support Line, entities delivering home-delivered meals, persons in long-term care facilities; and, Advisory Council members and others could be asked to reflect upon whether they have a friend who does not go out anymore (after the death of a spouse, etc.)

How do we involve the homebound seniors in optimal aging? Perhaps some might be encouraged to have a 'buddy' take them to events at senior centers or to lunch. Educate caregivers, volunteers, family members, home health agency staff, etc. to ask open-ended questions such as:

- "How satisfied are you with how things are going?"
- "Is there something more that you would like to be doing?"
- "What prevents you from doing it?"
- "Would you like me to help you problem-solve so you could be more active?"
- "What would you like to do?"

The latter question led to discussion about a tool in the form of a 'question tree.' Depending upon the answers given (yes, no), different ideas for resolving a problem could be diagrammed on the tree. This tool could be a resource on the OA link on the VCAAA website.

Other ideas included training home health care providers to encourage physical activity such as chair exercises, developing an elder buddies program, and someone reading to the homebound person.

There was discussion of the Best Cities for Successful Aging document that C. Voth had emailed to OAC members. M. Kaplan said it provided useful information and good tips for successful aging. Perhaps it would be good to compile a list of what constitutes successful aging in each city in the county, then advocate with city councils, etc.

D. Approval of Conversion of Grantee Contract with the Conejo Recreation and Park District (CRPD) to a Vendor Contract. After months of discussion with Conejo Recreation and Park District staff, we are recommending that the current grantee contract be converted to a vendor contract, effective July 1, 2015. This will substantially change the nature of the relationship with CRPD but will provide more flexibility in the provision of meals at the Goebel Senior Center. This change is a result of CRPD requesting a change in its program, as it explores a Café-style program. Rather than receiving grant funding and VCAAA supplying the food through Jordano's, eligible meals will be reimbursed on a per-meal basis. This amount is in the process of being negotiated. The total cost to the Senior Nutrition Program will not change. The amount available for a vendor contract for this community will be \$71,000 which includes the cost food. Donations collected at this meal site will be available to provide additional meals.
